

enry David Thoreau was a naturalist and philosopher who lived in Concord, Massachusetts, in the early 1800s. He spent a year living in a small one-room cabin in the woods at Walden Pond "because," he said, "I wished to live deliberately, to front only the essential facts of life, and see if I could not learn what it had to teach, and not when I came to die, discover that I had not lived. I did not wish to live what was not life, living is so dear." Thoreau seems to have sought the same reality pursued by the author of the Book of Wisdom, who preferred Lady Wisdom to power, deemed riches to be nothing, and loved wisdom more than health or beauty.


Like the man who comes to Jesus wanting to know what he must do to inherit eternal life, most of us have a difficult time surrendering that to which we cling. It may be our possessions, our power to control others, the need to be youthful and stylishly dressed, or an addiction to drugs or gambling or pornography—anything that has become our "best friend." Just as the apostles wonder who can then be saved, all of us wonder, because we,

too, have one or another such "best friends." It is God who breaks through, says Jesus. It may be a painful breaking through; it may be an upheaval; it may not be until the end of our lives. Always, it is God who ultimately turns us around. •

Pastor's Point

Dear Parishioners,

In the Gospel reading, a rich man believes he must do many things to inherit the kingdom of God and that he has done all of them. Jesus, however, teaches that only one thing is necessary: to follow Jesus. Once cannot carry heavy baggage around while following Jesus. One must travel light. This is what the rich man cannot do. He wants to have his possessions (plus security and prestige) and have Jesus too. Scripture also says: You cannot serve both God and mammon. (Matthew 6:24)

Still, Jesus looks at the rich man and loves him. In Hebrews, the Word of God discerns the thoughts of the heart. The Word is both Scripture, through which God continues to speak, and Jesus Christ, the Word incarnate (as in John 1:14). No creature is concealed from Jesus; we are all exposed or laid bare to his eyes. But the eyes that fully see us look at us, and into us, with love.

The disciples are amazed. How could it be that a man who has faithfully kept God's commandments cannot enter the kingdom of heaven simply because he has many possessions that he doesn't want to give up? Peter protests that the disciples have done what the rich man could not; they have given up everything to follow Jesus. They preferred Jesus to all earthly riches (see Wisdom 7:8-10). Jesus reassures them that they will receive a hundredfold reward for their sacrifice. Jesus is the only one who keeps his promises. As in Wisdom, "all good things"

come to the disciples in his company. The surprise is that they will receive it "in this present age" - perhaps through the fellowship and care of their new brothers and sisters in Christ (see Acts 2:44-47; 4:32–35). The catch is buried quietly in the last line: "with persecutions." Following Jesus is an abundant, overflowing life, but not one free from suffering. Do you relate to these Scriptures or not? God bless,

Bishop's Corner

Dear Fellow-Catholics,

It was recommended by "a higher power" that I remind the priests who minister in our diocese about the regulation of Canon Law that is quoted below. But I believe that it is good to make it known to all of our faithful, as perhaps not everybody has had a chance to learn about certain Church rules and their consequences for the functioning of our churches:

Canon 534

- Every parish priest (pastor or rector) is obliged to apply a Mass for the people entrusted to him on each Sunday and holy day of obligation in his diocese. If he is legitimately impeded from this celebration, he is to apply it on the same days through another priest or on other days himself.
- 2. A pastor/rector who has the care of several parishes is bound to apply only one Mass for the entire people entrusted to him on the days mentioned in #1.
- A pastor/rector who has not satisfied the obligation mentioned in #1 and #2 is to apply as soon as possible, as many Masses for the people that he has omitted.

Regarding #2, "the only one Mass for the entire people entrusted to him" does not forbid the priest from celebrating the Pro Populo Mass separately in each parish he ministers.

Dear Padre,

When should confirmation take place? I read that baptism, confirmation, and Eucharist were received all at the same time in the early Church.

Confirmation is one of the three sacraments of initiation. The other two are baptism and Eucharist. In the early Church, all three sacraments were usually received at the same time because most people receiving baptism were adults. As infant baptism started to become the norm, this sacrament was separated from the other two. After Vatican II, the trend moved the age of confirmation into the teenage years, so that in many places, confirmation takes place in seventh or eighth grade, or even later. There is still an argument among liturgists, educators, and theologians about whether such a separation should exist. Some think of confirmation as a coming-of-age sacrament, marking, as it were, the transition from childhood into adulthood in the Church. The theology



of this sacrament, however, is based upon baptism and connects it to the commission to go out and touch the world with our faith. The ideal age for confirmation is the age at which we can, with the grace of the Holy Spirit, conscientiously and reasonably witness to our faith.
