The TV coverage was more than amazing with unending hours of transmissions, insights, delights, highlights; having interviews with the so called protagonists, making programmes of their professional and private lives, re-living their goals and defenses, explaining mercifully their mistakes or bad reactions...It seems that the entire world was turning around a ball.

At the same time, a group of simple but amazing people were fighting to save the lives of 12 boys and their coach who became imprisoned by nature in a cave in Thailand. ## July 15, 2018 Fifteenth Sunday in Ordinary Time (B) Am 7:12–15 Eph 1:3–14 or 1:3–10 Mk 6:7–13

## Pastor's Dear Friends,

🥐 In the Gospel of this Sunday, we see Jesus sending the disciples two by two to announce that the Kingdom of God is at hand. However what Jesus meant by this is not what people were expecting. Israelite were in fact awaiting for a political ruler who would have delivered the people of Israel from the nations who were oppressing them.

The Messiah would have ruled then on the People of God and the people of God would have ruled over the other nations; and by being the King Messiah submitted Himself to God, in this way God would have been king over the entire world.

For Jesus instead the Kingdom of God is a condition of the soul, where the soul is united to God in a communion of intentions, perceptions and will: whoever is in the Kingdom of God sees things as God sees them, desires what God desires and does the will of God. By doing this one becomes literally one with God experiencing intimacy, fulfillment and joy. This does not imply anymore the change of any external condition, neither political, nor social, nor physical nor relational. We do not need to wait that something out there changes in order to enter the Kingdom; neither there is need for more money, for instance, nor that somebody may change his way of behaving with us.

The possibility to enter the Kingdom depends only on an interior disposition. This is the reason why the Kingdom is at hand: there is nothing that can prevent us today to enter the Kingdom except ourselves. This is the reason why Jesus sends the disciples with nothing (money, second clothes or whatever) and two by two (having to do with the complexity of relationships). This is the reason of this gesture of shaking the dust from the feet: it is a way to say that they have been offered a possibility and from that moment on, if people feel that their life is miserable they have only to blame themselves.

The consequence of embracing the kingdom is peace, Shalom, fulfillment, joy, inner pleasure. So the apostles bring the peace of the union with God with them, as a good that is bestowed upon those who receive them, as a good that however they have already within them. The happiness, the joy of the apostles (and of any Christian, for what concern us) does not depend on the fact that people may or may not receive them, it does not depend on the success of the endeavor. This is what Jesus means that if a house does not receive them, Peace will return back to them. The only thing that is relevant for the Apostles is that in this mission, in total poverty and depending only on the Lord, they will experience the Lord accompanying them and being with them: this is enough. Good for the people if they receive them and their word, however they, the Apostles, already have the Good they are offering to the people, the communion with God.

Today the mission of the Church continues, exactly in the same way. The Church constantly invites people to this union and communion, offering ways to foster it, to discover it, to learn to walk by it. Through participation in the Sacraments, prayer meetings, encounters to hear the Word of God, the Church is offering each of us a way to enter into this Kingdom or to root ourselves more deeply into it.

Good for those who take advantage of it. Nobody needs to do a favor for the pastor, or the Bishop, or whoever is inviting us. Nobody needs to make a favor of God. The kingdom of God is there, at hand for those who are smart enough to grab it, and if one tomorrow will be experiencing un-fulfillment and

frustration, in the end He can only blame oneself for it. However, know that the Kingdom of God is at hand!!!! God Bless you all,

When the Lord passes into our life and performs a miracle in each of us, and each of us knows what the Lord has done in our life, it does not end there: this is the invitation to go forward, to continue on the journey, seeking the face of God,' the Psalm says; seeking this joy.

What would Jesus think of so many Christians who stay put after they first grace they have received, who do not continue on the journey? They are like someone who would go to a restaurant and be content with an appetizer, and who would then return home, not realizing that the main course would have been even better

Because there are so many Christians who are stopped, who don't continue on the journey; Christians who have run aground on the concerns of daily life - good things in themselves! – but they don't grow, they remain small. Parked Christians: they've parked. Caged Christians who don't know how to fly with the dream to this beautiful thing to which the Lord calls us.

We can all ask ourselves the question, "What do I really desire?" Do I really desire God, and seek to be with Him? "Or am I afraid? Am I mediocre?" What is the measure of my desire? Am I satisfied with the appetizer, or do I desire the banquet that is set before me?

There is the invitation here to keep the desire alive, not to be content with where we are.

Then there is meditation and taking the Go forward a the newspaper on one side and think about God and about your soul and about all these things. We do not talk enough Christian takes to ourselves. We must tell ourselves that we are in His risks, he goes presence, that we are His children, that Christ has died for comfort zone. us and that He has reconciled us to God.
