



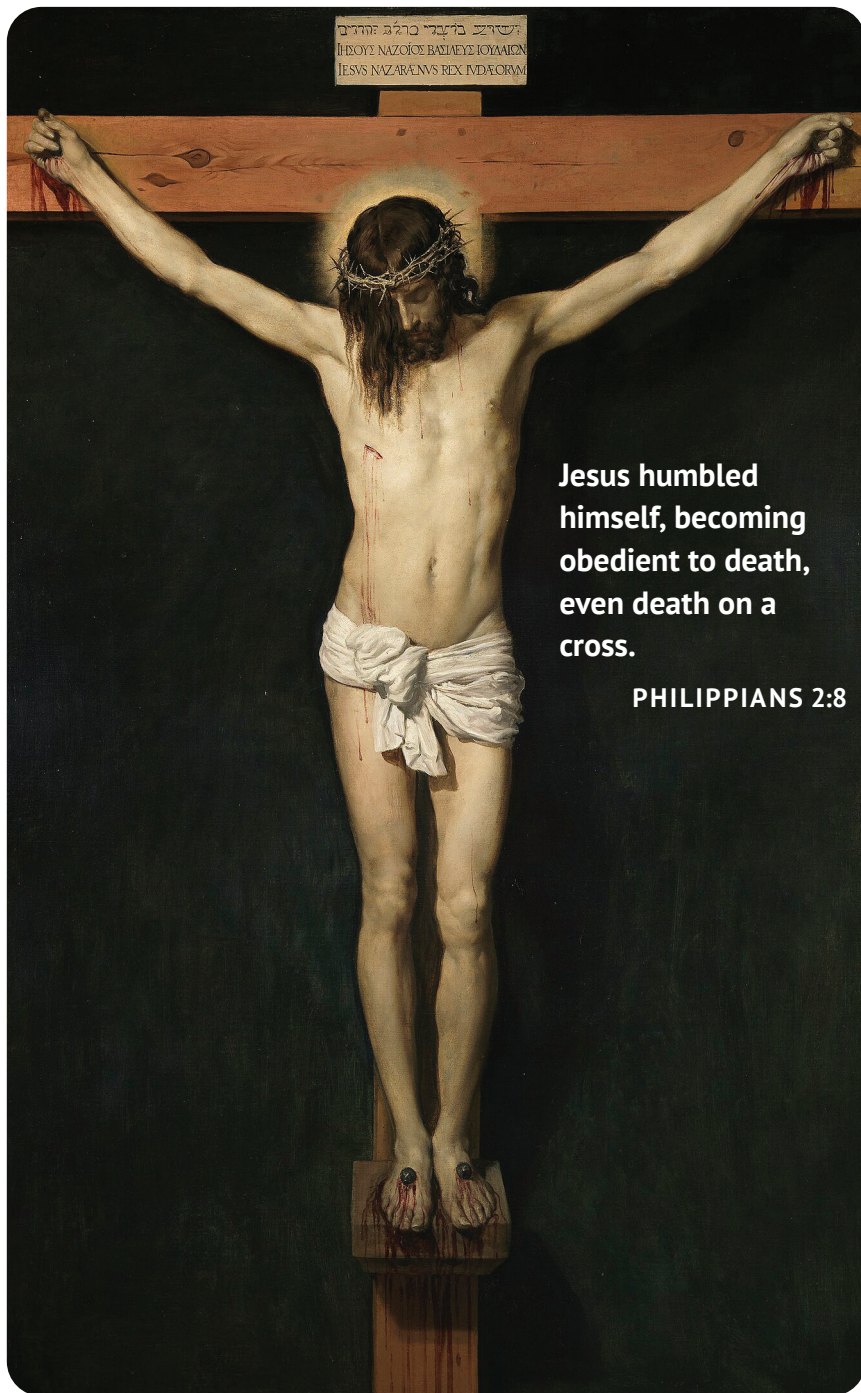
The Hungers with Which We Live

Tenzin Kiyosaki is a former Buddhist nun who now works as an interfaith chaplain at a medical center in Los Angeles. There she tends to the spiritual needs of patients who have less than six months to live. When her brother asked her what it was that dying patients talk about, it led to her book *The Three Regrets: Inspirational Stories and Practical Advice for Love and Forgiveness at Life's End*. The three regrets she lists are: 1) I did not live the life of my dreams; 2) I did not share my love; and 3) I did not forgive. All too easily it seems we become preoccupied with what in the end becomes peripheral to what we really seek in life.

Today we tell the story of how Jesus' life of loving others came to its final conclusion, one of sacrificial love to the point of death. He came to reveal how such love is an essential dimension of the presence of God at the heart of every human life, and a cornerstone of the kingdom of God he proclaimed and to which he gave his life.

To the end, even on the cross, forgiveness was an essential aspect of his life of loving others. The very realities of what Jesus' life was all about are the same hungers we so often fail to recognize as we live our lives, though it is what he continually preached. Coming face to face with our own mortality seems to make his message most real. ●

Pastor's Note

Dear friends,
As you read in the Bishop's Corner a couple of weeks ago, my time in Bermuda is approaching to an end and a new assignment is waiting for me. I have spent 25 years in different Parish assignments like in New Jersey, in Illinois and here in Bermuda. I have asked the Archbishop of Newark to be set free for a different kind of pastoral duty, not as a pastor or as a parish priest, but as a priest accompanying an itinerant team of catechists. In January I went to a meeting in Italy where I was assigned to a team that is currently evangelizing in Costa Rica. I have waited years to have the possibility to be released for this kind of experience. I had some experience of this kind for a couple of years before becoming a priest, as a seminarian, and now times have matured to go back to this experience as a presbyter. But now I have been enriched by 25 years of experience and by the experience of all of you and the people also that I have met before coming to Bermuda. I want to say that this special call was in the back of my mind when I felt the call to the priesthood. The hope one day to be able to be released for this kind of mission has been present to me all the time of my seminary and priestly life. I want also to share with you that I had a good relationship with Bishop Wes all these years, and I have made many friends in Bermuda. For sure, while I am preparing to leave the island, my desire is to leave this Holy Week and Easter in the most beautiful way with all

the celebrations which are the most important celebrations of the year for Christians and Catholics. Read the Flyer for the schedule. Then on Sunday the 7th of April at the 11:15 AM Mass the Bishop will come to celebrate with us inviting both communities of St Anthony's and St. Joseph's, St. Michael's (where I have been pastor for 6 years) and actually the whole diocese for a final moment of feast to be all together before I leave.

Bishop's Corner

Dear Fellow-Catholics,
As promised, here is the second part of the summary from the document of the Canadian Bishops on social media. To help guide Canadian Catholics in their use of social media, their Bishops offer seven commitments that can be made to better engage with people on social media:

1. Check for accuracy: Be vigilant about false information and never use social media with the intention to manipulate or deceive others;
2. Seek greater perspective: Social-media platforms make money by keeping people online, showing them people and information that conform to their interests and beliefs. We will need to be intentional about seeking information from sources to which we are not already inclined or predisposed;
3. Value human dignity: Always assume the best of people, and don't conflate their ideas with their personhood;
4. Bring curiosity into the conversation: Always seek to open dialogue rather than simply trading debate points;
5. Distinguish between intention and impact: Don't confuse how you feel about something someone says online with who they are or how they intended for you to perceive them;
6. Privilege "real-life" encounters: Social media should complement, not replace, face-to-face relationships and encounters. If social media does not lead to a more profound physical presence with one another in the larger picture, then it is no longer a helpful resource for Christian life;
7. Tend to one's online time: Be mindful of how long you are spending online. The bishops suggest fasting from screens once a week and taking a "technology Sabbath".

Holy Land Collection

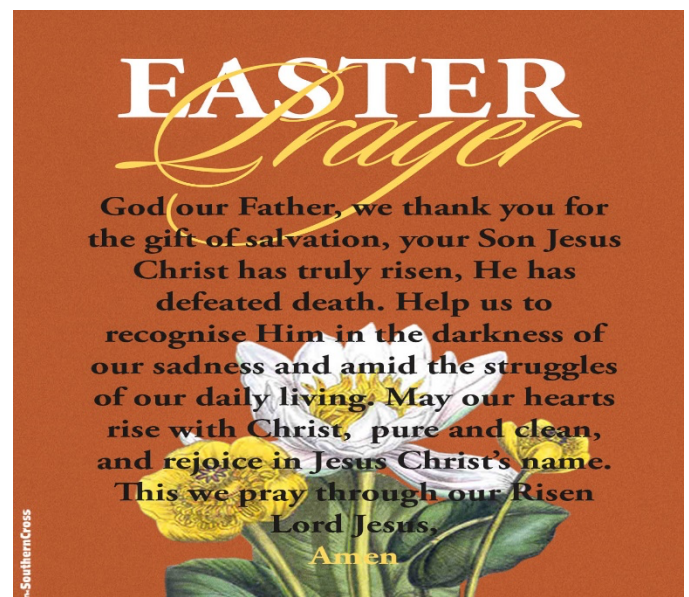
The Holy Land collection will take place on March 29th (Good Friday). Please be as generous as possible.

Dear Padre,

I am the divorced mother of three young children. My daughter is making her first Communion and I want to go to Communion with her. But I haven't been to Mass in three years because of my divorce. I am nervous and embarrassed about returning to the Church. What can I do?

Sharing in your daughter's preparation for holy Communion is a lovely desire and a good chance to look closely at your own faith; it may be the "little push" you need. She needs to see in you someone who has faith and is committed to the Church. Taking your children to Mass each Sunday is a good start.

You mentioned that you haven't been to church in three years because of your divorce. You may be confused about the teachings of the Church concerning divorce. Divorced Catholics are still full members of the Church and can receive holy Communion. If you have remarried outside the Church, it is a more complicated issue, yet not hopeless.

Since you haven't been to Mass in three years, the first step is to talk to your pastor or another priest with whom you feel comfortable. Be honest. Explain why you have stayed away from the Church. Then set up a time to go to confession. And please don't be ashamed or embarrassed about coming back to church. No matter how long it has been, the Church welcomes you home. ●
